Frank Marin, Burnt Hills, NY
Grant to study Space Debris Solution

Frank Marin remembers being inspired by NASA as a child to pursue aerospace engineering.

Now a student at Syracuse University, Marin is one step closer to developing new technology to address the growing issue of space debris thanks to a grant from Hunter's Fund.

Originally from Burnt Hills, NY, Marin became interested in the problem of space debris in Earth's orbit as a high school student. His passion led him to pursue aerospace engineering at Syracuse with plans to also complete an MBA.

With the grant from Hunter's Fund, Marin will develop a prototype over the next year to capture and remove dangerous space debris using specialized technology.

Marin believes his concept can reduce collisions from the over 750,000 pieces of debris currently in orbit - unlike other proposed solutions.

"I want to make something that has a positive impact on the world," he said. "This technology can help the space industry for years to come."

The Hunter's Fund awards grants annually to young people and students like Marin pursuing promising ideas in entrepreneurship, research, and the arts.

Support for Innovative Mental Health Technology

Recent UC San Diego graduate Norah Al-Azzam has a passion for improving mental health treatment.

Driven by the global mental health crisis, she co-founded a startup called NanoMood in 2020 to develop technology that continuously monitors mental health biomarkers.

"Our goal is to harness technology and data to create innovative mental health solutions," said Al-Azzam. "We want to make a meaningful difference for those struggling with mental illness."

NanoMood's wearable device aims to quantify mental states in real time by tracking key biological and physiological data. This provides patients and doctors with insights to enable earlier intervention and lifestyle changes.

With a grant from Hunter's Fund, NanoMood will further develop its prototype and conduct pilot studies in partnership with UC San Diego Health and the VA.

Originally from San Diego, Al-Azzam became passionate about this cause while earning her neuroscience degree from UC San Diego.

Driven by the global mental health crisis, she believes NanoMood's technology has potential to revolutionize mental health treatment and significantly improve patient outcomes.



Plushies Promote Neurodiversity

Sasha Stoppi, a senior at New World School of the Arts in Miami, has been awarded a Hunter's Fund grant to launch her business - Pudding Buddies.

These plush toys are designed to meet the needs of neurodiverse kids

through built-in "stimming tools" that provide sensory input. Stoppi is neurodivergent herself and created Pudding Buddies to offer comfort, sensory stimulation, and community connection.

The grant will allow her to manufacture an initial production run and bring the plushes to market.

She hopes her trendy plush char-

acters will increase understanding and acceptance of conditions like ADHD, autism, and anxiety.

Stoppi has already won multiple youth business competitions for Pudding Buddies, including first place regionally among 23,000 NFTE applicants.

She is confident the toys can make a difference for neurodiverse children who need supportive tools for self-regulation.

We're proud to support Stoppi's promising idea that exemplifies the values Hunter's Fund - using creativity and passion to help others. Pudding Buddies has potential to create an impact.

Expansion for Successful Podcast Business

Jacob O'Connor has been perfecting his podcasting skills since high school.

After years of recording episodes focused on inspiring conversations, he launched Real Conversations in 2022.

Hunter's Fund first learned of Jacob after he had successfully landed an interview with Netflix founder Reed Hasting and we were able to help him improve his podcasting studio.

Now a student at Wichita State University, O'Connor has been awarded another Hunter's Fund grant to upgrade his studio equipment and continue his successful podcast business.

He's dedicated over 4,500 hours to podcasting in the past four years.

The grant will allow O'Connor to

purchase upgraded microphones, headphones, and other gear to continue producing high-quality episodes as his listenership expands.

"I want to impact others through podcasting. Growing my audience matters because the more listeners, the more I can inspire," said O'Connor.

"This equipment means the world to me. It will take the podcast to a whole new level," said O'Connor.

He sees the podcast as his lifelong legacy.

Originally from Columbia, IL, O'Connor is passionate about having authentic discussions and motivating people to chase their dreams through his podcast.

Matthew Andrew Braxton, El Paso TX

Grant for Modular Computer Cases to Reduce E-Waste

Matthew Braxton, an engineering student at the University of Texas at El Paso, wants to make technology more sustainable.

With a grant from Hunter’s Fund, he plans to manufacture and distribute eco-friendly modular computer cases through his startup Revcorp PC.

Braxton will 3D print the patent-free cases using biodegradable PLA filament made from algae, instead of plastic. The cases’ interchangeable parts allow specific components to be replaced, extending the computer’s lifespan and reducing electronic waste.

He plans to make the design open-source.

A graduate of Pebble Hills High School, Braxton started Revcorp PC to provide quality, affordable computers and technology services in El Paso.

“Proprietary parts contribute greatly to e-waste. Our modular cases empower users to modify and repair computers themselves,” said Braxton.

The grant will help him distribute the sustainable cases commercially while allocating profits to supply refurbished computers to those in need.

We’re proud to support Braxton’s promising idea to creatively tackle electronic waste. His innovative thinking and dedication to service exemplify the spirit of Hunter’s Fund.

Musician Creates Audio Books Promoting Wellness

Driven by her passion for music, writing, and wellbeing, musician Louisa Hygate in Bristol UK has been awarded a Hunter’s Fund grant to produce an audio book series called Storio - promoting positive mental health in 8 to 12 year olds.

Each 20-30 minute episode will teach mindfulness, gratitude, and wellbeing through adapted fables and original ideas. Hygate will compose lyrical songs and music for each story to uniquely engage young listeners.

“I want to use my skills to help prepare children for the journey ahead,” said Hygate. She has taught music lessons and performed music thera-

py, learning music’s impact on wellbeing.

The grant will allow Hygate to purchase high-quality audio recording equipment and software to produce the series. She’ll collaborate with voice actors and illustrators to bring the stories to life.

The musical audio books will fill a need for mental health content tailored to younger audiences.

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Sea Moss Business Succeeding with Hunter's Grant



Here's an update from an ambitious young Grant Winner from the Caribbean island of Bequia.

Tavio Simmons was a beneficiary of a Hunter's Grant, using funds raised locally, helping him realize his dream of exploring the future of sea moss farming.

With help from a local non-profit organization in 2020, Tavio received training in sea moss farming, providing him with the knowledge he needed in subsurface aquaculture and the potential for the local economy for this efficient farming method already successfully tested in neighboring islands.

Sea Moss is a red seaweed found along the coasts and is prized for its health benefits.

Rich in vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants, traditionally used in foods, remedies and skin care products.

Upon launching his business, a grant from Hunter's Fund provided Tavio with scuba diving training and scientific data collection equipment needed to improve the yield and quality of his sea moss.

Here is Tavio's 6-month Report on his efforts.

Six-Month Grant Progress Report

"Our initial methods, featuring a simple yet innovative combination of rope and recycled bottles for flotation, have been upgraded thanks to the grant from Hunter's Fund.

Now, we employ robust pipe frames and effective cement-made anchors, ensuring our sea moss farms resist strong ocean currents. These upgrades have enhanced our operations and drawn significant interest from tourists and locals alike."

Our venture operates as a three-man team, focusing on identifying strengths, overcoming challenges, and building a successful and sustainable sea moss business in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

We're taking strides toward business registration, effective branding, and rigorous market research to scale our business and offer our products internationally. Looking ahead, we have outlined a few key objectives:

Phase 1 - We aim to launch a fully operational website with redesigned product packaging.

Phase 2 - We hope to replace our row boat with a proper motor boat to aid our operations.

Phase 3 - our vision is to establish a climate-smart facility for processing, packaging, and preparing sea moss for distribution and export.

I want to extend our gratitude to the supporters of Hunter's Fund. Without you, none of this would be possible.

We're confident that our team will reach new heights in their venture with your backing.

Thank you for being a crucial part of this journey.

This Spring Hunter's Fund published the first Red Book, showcasing the young people who have been funded by Hunter's Fund.


Thanks to the generous support of our donors the Red Book serves as a written and permanent testament to our impact on these lives.





Prominent Group lends support to Hunter's Grant Program



Blackstone LaunchPad is a program started by the Blackstone Charitable Foundation designed to support entrepreneurial learning

and activity among college students and provide them with the tools necessary to launch successful ventures to foster entrepreneurship and innovation.

It operates from a network of campuses around the world and provides aspiring student entrepreneurs with mentorship, networking opportunities, and access to a range of resources including workshops, events, and "Shark Tank" likecompetitions.

It was the Blackstone Launchpad

at Syracuse where Hunter's Fund first encountered a small group of students receiving Grants from Hunter's Fund and also participating in the Blackstone LaunchPad programs.

This past Spring we asked the Blackstone Foundation to help us engage with their network of campuses where their programs were established to help more young entrepreneurs be made aware of the Hunter's Fund mission and help uncover more innovative and creative ideas

to apply for Hunter's Grants.

With their assistance we have seen the number of applications during the current Round triple with some of the most creative applications we've ever received.

Thanks to the Blackstone Launchpad for their support in helping Hunters Grants reach more young innovators.

Safe Driving Weeks Reaches 16 More Campuses

The effectiveness of Hunter's Pledge to end distracted driving hinges on the commitment of students, one pledge at a time. Initially, Hunter's fraternity, Phi Kappa Psi, provided volunteers to facilitate this on campuses. However, as the initiative gained traction, more volunteers were needed.

To meet this demand, Phi Kappa Psi began collaborating with sororities. The resulting partnership was instrumental in reaching many more students.

Achievement from this past Spring include:

- **University of Louisiana at Lafayette:** Inclusion of sororities led to a record-breaking 533 pledges.
- **Oregon State University:** A blend of creative events, like a Greek Game show, spurred 1600 pledges.

- **University of Oregon:** Despite being a small team of 15, they encouraged over 100 pledges in their debut Safe Driving Week.

- **University of Minnesota Duluth:** Gaining consistent support from campus police, they've hosted the campaign for seven consecutive years.

- **University of Nebraska:** Interactive events like "Pie-a-Phi-Psi" enhanced their campaign.

- **Penn State University:** They expanded outreach with a month-long campaign this spring, following a successful fall campaign.

- **Miami University of Ohio:** With the support of alumni, they collected 300 pledges in their inaugural Safe Driving Week.

- **Allegheny College:** A unique raffle prize and parent networking increased pledge numbers.

- **Indiana State University:** Their Chili Cook Off engaged diverse student groups.

- **DePaul University:** After gathering 500 pledges this spring, they're considering a fall campaign.

- **University of Alabama at Huntsville:** Alumni backing boosted their first Safe Driving Week.

- **University of Toledo:** Partnering with a sorority, they hosted varied events like car washes and increased pledges.

- **Saint Joseph's University:** Following a campus merger, they organized campaigns at two locations, including a benefit concert.

- **University of Pennsylvania:** Collaborated with a sorority for events like bake sales, achieving their goal of 100 pledges.

- **York College:** Their first-time campaign involved alumni support and bi-weekly tabling for a month.

- **Towson University:** Their experience enabled them to host an independent Safe Driving Week without external help.

As a boy and a young man ...

Hunter lit up the lives of his mother, Judy, his father, Jerry, his older brother, Teddy, and all his extended family.

As a friend ... Hunter cultivated deep and lasting relationships and will never be forgotten by those who knew him best.



As an athlete ... Hunter loved baseball, soccer, football and wrestling, excelling as an individual while always striving to lift up his teammates.

BEYOND THE REPORT CARD: SEARCHING FOR PASSION AND DEDICATION



Hunter's Fund believes the American education system overemphasizes grades, which don't always reflect individuals' potential. Criticisms of grade-driven education include:

Learning for the Test

Overemphasis on grades and standardized tests may limit curriculum to "teach to the test" rather than produce well-rounded individuals, not just those who can excel in examinations and undermining holistic development.

Creativity and Critical Thinking

Standardized tests may stifle creativity and critical thinking—skills essential for real-world problem-solving but hard to measure through multiple-choice questions.

Stress

Persistent academic pressure can negatively affect students' mental health and overall well-being.

Inequity

Socioeconomic disparities arise when students from affluent families access resources like tutors to score better, disadvantaging less privileged students.

Other Skills

Schools focusing heavily on grades might overlook students' emotional and social development, which are critical for life success in life.

Learning Motivation

Grades-oriented learning could undermine intrinsic motivation, leading students to pursue high scores instead of true understanding of the subject.

Lack of Individual Assessment

Standardized tests disregard individual learning styles and pace, potentially misrepresenting some students' understanding or capabilities.

While recognizing the necessity of assessment for accountability and improvement, striking a balance to encourage love for learning, creativity, and holistic development is crucial.

Hunter's Fund employs alternative assessment methods, examining candidates' passion, time investment in interests, and self-expression through short videos. This approach acknowledges potential beyond traditional grading systems, promoting diverse skills and unique perspectives potentially overlooked by GPAs.

Our philosophy isn't meant to undermine academics or the perseverance grades may signify. Instead, we assert that an individual's potential cannot be solely determined by standardized test performance.

Our goal is fostering an environment that values passion, creativity, resilience—traits often underappreciated in traditional academic settings. By assessing candidates' commitment and dedication, we provide an equal opportunity for all, regardless of socio-economic or academic background.

Our innovative approach encourages students to embrace learning beyond scores, to cultivate their individuality, and to grow into well-rounded individuals prepared to contribute to society significantly.

We stand firm in our belief that every student has a unique spark. Our unconventional methodology is our commitment to igniting that spark, nourishing it, and enabling it to illuminate and grow into a flame that will light up the future.. By focusing on the person over the grade, we honor Hunter's legacy and drive meaningful change in education and beyond.
