Hunter's Fund Grants are for young people between the ages of 16 and 25 who have demonstrated passion, creativity and drive for their future. You helped us provide grants to the following individuals.

Kenichia Charles

Kenichia Charles is a biomedical technician, teacher, and entrepreneur dedicated to improving the safety and efficiency of medical equipment in the Caribbean islands.

While working in the medical field in St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Charles noticed a severe lack of resources and attention to the upkeep and maintenance of medical equipment.

"Preventative maintenance and performance inspection of medical equipment contribute to prolonged equipment lifespan as well as to reduction in the failure rate of the equipment."

Her grant from Hunter's Fund will provide the means to invest in biomedical repair tools and test



equipment to establish the first medical equipment maintenance and repair company in St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

"What I have recognized over the years is that many health pro-

fessionals and administrators have failed to place much-needed emphasis on the importance of the maintenance of medical machinery, particularly in St Vincent and the Grenadines," Charles said.

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islands by creating educational videos and digital content that highlight important voices, causes, and traditions in Caribbean culture.

"We want to help our Vincen-tian children connect to their roots their culture using the platform of video... to act as the bridge and reawaken the pass-

ing down of traditions and cul-ture and create an appreciation for the current times," Corea said.

Hunter's Fund will enable Corea to create the pilot season of a show that will dive deep into the history of the islands and its people. "We will be creating the experience of sitting on the

porch, listening to your grand-mother telling tales of when she was younger, the fairy tales of old and mysterious creatures that used to hang around, the beginning of a tradition. Let's make history entertaining and start family conversations about heritage again".

Cenus Hinds

Cenus Hinds is the founder of Cariway, a tourism company in St. Vincent and the Grenadines offering kayaking and diving tours to locals and tourists alike. The company was inspired by the idea of enabling locals to have unique experiences within their own country and showing island inhabitants hidden gems of their homeland.

Hinds founded Cariway after college with his own savings but has dreamed of expanding its offerings to island-hopping tours, recreational fishing and small boat tours.

"I did all tours myself for a full year, learning what my customers actually like and want, grew the kayak fleet, and then hired an employee," Hinds said.

The money from Hunter's Fund will help Hinds buy a



larger boat, fishing gear, snorkeling equipment, and hire additional employees to expand Cariway's scope in the Caribbean tourism industry.

"If I am able to complete this

current project with Cariway, my community would benefit directly with a job opportunity for youths who may be interested in tourism and entrepreneurship on the whole.

drivers on the island,” Campbell said. “Especially teenagers who just got their license and they drive recklessly, always on their phone and always texting. They’re not paying attention to how dangerous it is.”

With approximately 2,300 members in St. Vincent and The Grenadines, the Girl Guides program encourages young girls and women to become agents of change by speaking up and taking action on important issues in their communities.

Through the partnership with Hunter’s Fund, the Girl Guides will encourage community members to sign the pledge to avoid distracted driving.

“In St. Vincent and the Grenadines, we struggle with safe driving, especially college students and public transportation,” Campbell said “They contribute

to a high percentage of accidents relating to distracted driving... safe driving should be encouraged more in the community.”

While the pandemic and social distancing requirements postponed the majority of in-person events planned by the organization, Campbell said that Girl Guides members throughout the region have participated in virtual activities in order to keep their causes alive.

“We were unable to meet face to face,” Campbell said. “however it allowed us to take advantage of the internet by posting activities for all members to take part in.”

Hunter’s Pledge to End Distracted Driving is coming to Mustique thanks to a new partnership with the Girl Guides Association of St. Vincent and The Grenadines.

Hunter’s Pledge program was developed in 2016 as a way to encourage young adults to change their driving behaviors. Throughout each school year, participants at colleges and universities across the United States set up tabling

events where students are encouraged to sign a pledge committing to avoid distracted driving. In total, more than 20,000 students have signed the pledge.

Chevelle Campbell, Chairperson of the Junior Council for the Girl Guides Association of Saint Vincent and The Grenadines, said that distracted driving education is especially important in the lives of young adults on the island.

“There are a lot of distracted

Every year thousands of lives, like Hunter’s, are lost as a result of fatal automobile crashes.

Teens and young adults are the largest age group involved in distracted driving accidents. Texting and cell phones are suspected as major causes. But eating, socializing while driving and even putting on make-up are also causes of distracted driving.


Hunter’s Fund has launched

more than 35 campaigns on campuses in the US where students sign Hunter’s Pledge Not to Drive Distracted and receive a free wristband in return. Studies have shown that signing a written pledge results in a 47% better chance of changing behavior than any other incentive.

Efforts are underway to ex-

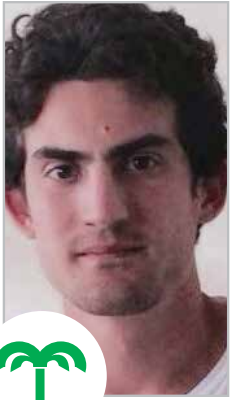
pand these campaigns to St. Vincent and the UK by providing free of charge, posters, pledge forms, and wrist bands to young people signing pledge forms.

Hunter's Team

Each member of the Hunter's Fund was a close friend of Hunter Watson. Their encouragement led the Watson family to establish the Hunter Watson Memorial Fund, with Hunter's Team making the important decisions. At first, the family thought this group of college-age students would award financial aid scholarships to students, but when they met for the first time, it became clear they had something more unique in mind. They wanted to award and encourage young people with novel and creative ideas who might not ordinarily receive recognition or win awards. Three years later, the Committee has reviewed and graded hundreds of applications and identified more than 40 young dreamers including many in the UK and on St. Vincent who could not have explored their dreams without financial assistance. Each of our grantees is also "mentored" by one of the Team Members.

A Safe Haven: Locals and travelers find refuge from COVID-19 in Mustique

Mustique is one of few areas in the world relatively untouched by COVID-19. No deaths have occurred on the island, and only 73 cases have been recorded in St. Vincent and The Grenadines since March.

The island's remote location, small year-round population, and lack of cases established it as a refuge for travelers to wait out the pandemic.

James 'Jamie' Alexander White, a UK native, living in Marbella, Spain, decided in March to leave his home and wait out the pandemic with friends on the island.

White packed a bag and planned to stay for "a few weeks" in Mustique, which he described as "an absolute paradise."

He ended up staying for 6 months.

"When we first arrived, the Cotton House was open," White said. "We were scared to interact with people at first... but it looked like Mustique was completely untouched by everything... And then, very quickly, within two or three days of us arriving, we were locked down."

Gabija Mitchell, a creative director, DJ, and producer on the island, had been working for months to plan a music festival scheduled to take place over Easter weekend. But as the island went on lockdown in March and April, it quickly became clear that the festival would be postponed.

People throughout Mustique described a moment of relief after realizing that with no incoming flights and no cases on the island — there was no need to socially distance to the extent seen in other areas of the world.



"We were so locked off, we didn't really have people coming in from the mainland... they stopped the flights and everything," Mitchell said. "So after about six weeks of fearing one another and not knowing really who was here and avoiding contact with the outside world, there was one party when we all realized... OK, it's all right, we're safe now."

Since the lockdown lifted, Mitchell said she spends most of her time creating and collaborating with other musicians, artists, and creatives on the island.

"We're here on a beautiful island. We have a space where we can create something beautiful," Mitchell said. "Just feeding off of the creative energy that we've already built up... We are very lucky."

White said he spent his time watching over his friend's kids, meeting new people, and soaking up the magic of the island.

"We had the most amazing time," White said. "The community and the spirit there were just incredible... People that kept to themselves usually, that had been on the island for a long time but had never spoken to each other, different age groups... It was magical," White said

Hunter Watson was like "the boy next door" at our house on Mustique. At first, I was friends with his older brother Teddy, who was closer to my age. In those early years, Hunter was just the kid brother. A bit goofy. He loved video games and music and wrote songs about video games.

Then one day I looked up and said, "Wow, Hunter's not a kid anymore." And we discovered that we had a lot in common. He could be silly, but he was also extremely kind and very smart.

One summer in particular, we spent nearly all of our time on the island with each other — when I left to return to the U.K., I knew I was really going to miss him.

When I heard Hunter had died, I was really sad because I know he and I would have been friends for life. I still think of him often. I wasn't one of his closest friends, but Hunter had a huge impact on me.

He still shows up in my dreams sometimes. He'll say, "I'm here,

and I'm always around." And when I wake up, I'm reminded how much he is still present in the people who knew him, and on the island, and the entire community that Hunter's Fund is helping to create.

It's so fitting that Hunter is still helping people even though he's gone. He always gave people the opportunity to be themselves fully. That was his gift to everyone who knew him. But, ironically, because his own life was cut short, he never had the chance to fully blossom himself. I'm so grateful, that through Hunter's Fund, he's still helping others grow into their greatness today.

One New Year's Eve after Hunter died, I was dancing with Teddy. I said, "I really wish Hunter was here." He said, "Me too." We were completely still. I told him about the dream. He cried a bit and I cried a bit. And we hugged. It was really lovely.

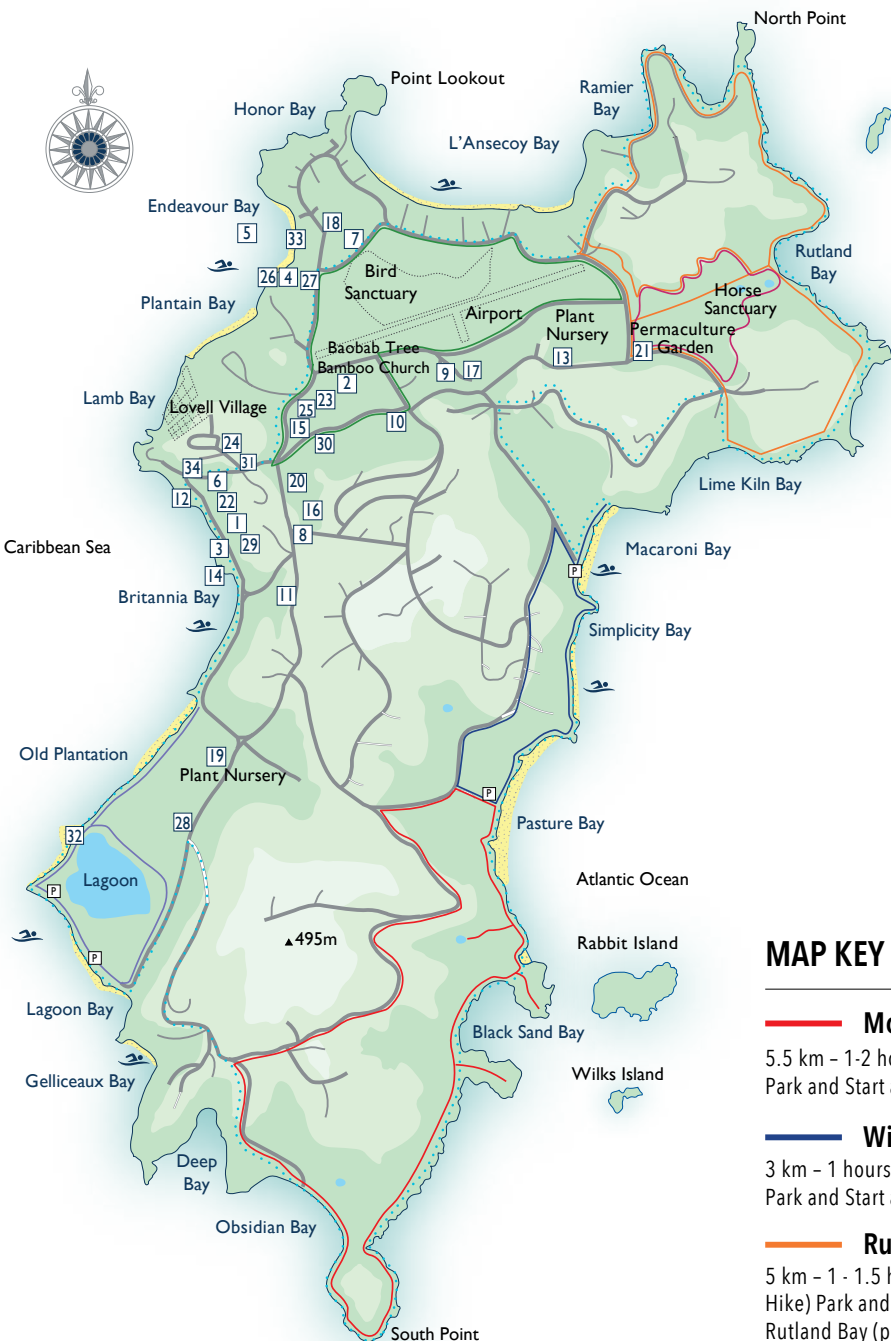
Then we did a dance and it felt like Hunter was there dancing with us.

Charity Begins on Mustique

The proverb, charity begins at home, dates to the time of the Roman comic playwright, Terence (about 190-159 BC). Over the years, the definition has evolved. In 1383, John Wycliffe wrote: "charity should begin at himself." Five hundred years later Dickens said, "charity begins at home, and justice begins next door." The Cambridge Dictionary definition is "you should take care of your family and other people who live close to you before helping people who live further away or in another country."

Charities on Mustique are the embodiment of this proverb and are engaged in a variety of activities to serve different needs of the local population. Hunter's Fund applauds their work while it continues its focus on: saving lives through its distracted driving campaigns and encouraging entrepreneurship through its grant programs. Here's a list of the charities which are actively working to improve the lives of the local population:

Basil Charles Educational Foundation - started in 1996. The Foundation started a scholarship program to help offset the cost of secondary education and make it more accessible to those in need. Additionally, funds support early childhood education and a stem summer program. Most of the funding comes from the revenue generated by the annual Mustique Blues Festival.

Hunter's Fund - established in 2016 by Hunter's friends from Mustique who were devastated by the loss of their friend Hunter Watson who died as a passenger in a distracted driving accident. They wanted to help young people from St. Vincent and the Grenadines who had visions of something they wanted to be but lacked the resources to explore those dreams and whose parents worked so hard to make this paradise possible. Funding for the Mustique program is provided exclusively by visitors and homeowners who come to our beautiful island and want to help fund the dreams of these young people.

Mustique Charitable Trust - founded in 2008 and funded by the homeowners of Mustique. The mission is to improve the opportunities of children, young people and vulnerable adults while supporting the development of sustainable local communities throughout SVG. The Trust aims to coordinate and enhance the charitable giving of the Mustique community.

Mustique Educational Trust - established 30 years ago by Mick Jagger, Basil Charles and Ouida Touche, it was founded to establish a primary school for the children of Mustique and secondary school support for the children of those who work on Mustique. Additional activities include the provision of interest-free loans for post-secondary education, adult education programs such as literacy, math, computers and skill training.

Mustique Medical Trust - In cooperation with Dr. Michael Bunbury, the Trust provides funds for emergency services for the local population. Funded primarily from donations from grateful patients and others who value the availability of emergency services.

SVG Environment Fund - founded a couple of years ago by Bryan Adams, is a non-profit dedicated to supporting the most effective environmental projects and campaigns. The Fund gives grants to both organizations and individuals actively engaged in the region, and with its partners, works to protect and restore the natural environment and influence local and visitors to be more respectful of their surroundings.

Thank You for Making a Difference

If you sometimes wonder if the support you've given to Hunter's Fund has made a difference, the answer is in the responses we've received from our grant winners. You may have never personally met any of these innovative young people, but your generosity has helped each of them turn their dreams and passions into reality.

We wish there was a way for each of these innovative young people to be able to thank you directly for helping them move forward in projects that mean a great deal to them, and that just may have a significant impact on our world.

You may not know a great deal about computer technology and robotics, but one of the grants you've helped Fund on St. Vincent is enabling a young man from an impoverished background to further his studies and research in that area, research that may affect us all in the future.

You may not have earned a commercial pilot's license, participat-

ed in a conference on international relations and conflict resolution, or established a charity to support research and education for people suffering traumatic brain injuries, but the grants you have helped Fund have enabled the innovative young grantees to do those things and so much more.

You may never have met Hunter Watson in his too-short life, but his tragic death as a passenger in an automobile accident did not end the love so many people had for him, or the admiration for his talents and passions in so many areas.

UK Taxpayers can now Give to Overseas Charities, and have your gift topped off with Gift Aid.

Using a CAF Charity Account

WHAT IS A CAF CHARITY ACCOUNT?

The CAF Charity Account is a way for UK taxpayers to organise their charitable giving to support all their favourite causes from one account by setting up regular standing orders or making one-off donations. Opening a CAF Charity Account is quick and easy – simply complete their online application form and agree to top-up with at least £10 per month. The whole process, including setting up your Direct Debit, should take no more than five minutes.

Give more with Gift Aid

Complete just one Gift Aid Declaration Form, and CAF will automatically add 25p to every £1 you give.

Overseas donations

Just complete a CAF overseas donation request for the charity you want to donate to. They'll even validate the charity for you, to make sure your donation is going to a legitimate project, and arrange for your donation to be paid to them. If a charity needs to be validated, there's a one-time validation fee of £35. The overseas transaction fee is £20, and the minimum you can donate overseas is £250.

During the application process, you should request a CAF Charity Voucher Book, so you can make gifts using Vouchers from this Book to charities you wish to support all over the world and not just UK charities.

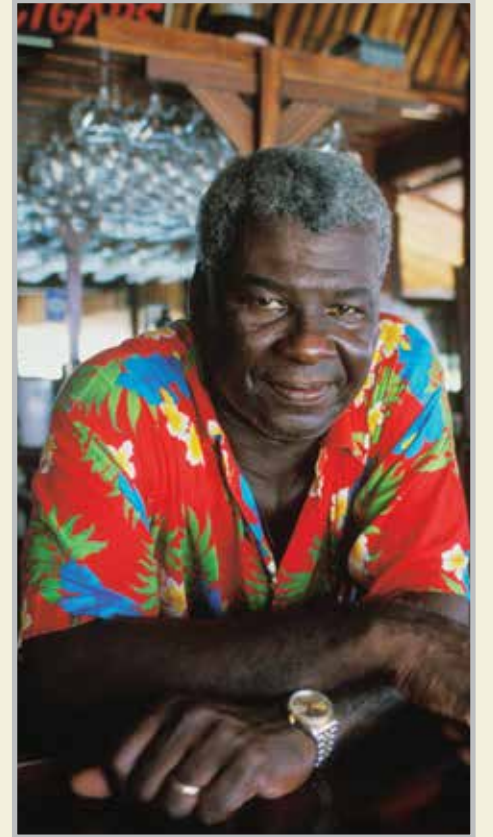
